THAT'S A WRAP! We would like to say thank you to all of our clubs, members, trail pass holders, sponsors and supporters for a great 2022 season. Though the season was short for users in the Central and Eastern Regions, clubs in Western and Northern areas experienced a great winter. Our winter operating season may be over, however clubs will continue to work hard over the spring, summer and fall with needed trail repairs and maintenance.

# **Investment in new trail maintenance equipment** Big news for our snowmobile community! On March 11, members of the NLSF were joined by representatives from the federal and provincial Government to announce a total investment of \$1,506,000 for new and improved trail maintenance equipment to increase the sustainability of the provincial snowmobile tourism sector.

The Government of Canada, through the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA), has provided a \$495,000 contribution to upgrade and replace trail maintenance equipment. The Government of Newfoundland and Labrador through the Department of Industry, Energy and Technology (IET) and the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts and Recreation (TCAR) has also invested \$495,000 in the project. NLSF will be investing the remaining \$516,000. This money will be used to purchase 20 new drags, meaning every groomer in each club across the island will receive a new drag. We are also purchasing 2 new Prinoth Husky snow groomers, a small farm tractor with tracks (as pictured below), and trail signage will be increased.

As the Newfoundland and Labrador Snowmobile Federation, with the help of our dedicated volunteers, we support snowmobilers by keeping trails safe and well-developed throughout the winter season. By supporting people being out on the trails, we help stimulate the local economy and keep tourism opportunities running when snow covers the ground.





### SnowTrax Television Return to Western Newfoundland

The NLSF were excited to host SnowTrax for a second time. The crew arrived March 21 and spent the week in Western Newfoundland in the Bonne Bay and Corner Brook area.

Along with great snowmobiling conditions, SnowTrax also experienced Newfoundland and Labrador's unique culture, and have certainly helped to showcase what the winter tourism industry in our province has to offer.

#### **Trails and Grooming update**

Another grooming season has come to an end, and despite less than favourable conditions in several club areas, the NLSF along with our clubs and volunteers have been able to make the most of it. Trail pass sales remained strong again this year, and although final numbers have yet to be tabulated, we are estimating that the NLSF has put out in excess of 4500 grooming hours across the province. Clubs have been busy throughout the winter with not just grooming operations, but brush and alder clearing as well. Much of this work is headed by the massive volunteer base we are so fortunate to have here at the NLSF. Plans are in place to continue this work across the board throughout



this Spring, Summer and Fall with vegetation control as well as ground work and bridge repairs wherever needed. I would like to thank all trail pass buyers, volunteers and staff who made this past season possible. We look forward to next season, and we are hoping for better snow conditions for all parts of the province next Winter!

Hats off to everyone and happy trails. Enjoy what we have to offer.



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
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
# Thank you, Volunteers!
