

Some regions—particularly Eastern and Central Newfoundland—are still experiencing lower snow levels, which has limited grooming operations. Unfortunately, the Northern Peninsula has also seen less snow than usual. On a positive note, Western Newfoundland has received higher snowfall, allowing grooming to commence on a regular basis.

While pass sales are down this season, we've still managed to log approximately 1,880 hours of grooming so far. Your support plays a crucial role in maintaining the quality of our trails. Every pass sold helps fund grooming, trail maintenance, culvert repairs, grading, vegetation control and bridge repairs. 

- · Ensure your snowmobile is working properly.
- Avoid riding along power lines and watch for guy wires.
- Steer clear of high snow banks around overhanging power lines.
- Proceed slowly near utility workers, vehicles or equipment.
- Stay off the ice, including reservoirs and rivers near hydroelectric dams where ice is unstable.



Behind the Scenes of Perfectly Groomed Trails


Ever wondered what goes into creating a perfectly groomed trail? Grooming snow is more than just driving a groomer over a trail – it's a precise and skilled job that requires knowledge, practice and attention to detail. Many people don't realize how much goes into creating those smooth, pristine trails that we all enjoy.

From adjusting the blade angle to managing the snow in the drag, grooming involves making real-time decisions to ensure the terrain is both safe and enjoyable. It's about balancing the equipment, the snow and the environment to make every run as perfect as possible.

In this process, operators must navigate obstacles, understand the science behind snow movement and adjust their techniques for everything from managing deep untouched snow to hard packed heavily traveled trails. It's a combination of skill, intuition and hands-on practice and it takes time to master.

Next time you enjoy the groomed trails, take a moment to appreciate the effort that goes into making them perfect.


